Dear friends at Mt. Zion,

We are living in unnerving times. There is a surfacing of things we would rather not think about, hear about or talk about. Some of these things cut our souls – human trafficking, the abuse of children, patterns of sexual misconduct, blatant racial prejudices to name a few. Sin, selfishness, taking advantage of others seems everywhere. It is a Halloween time. (Not the fun kind of Trunk Or Treat Halloween time that we had at the church – but the original "All Hallow's Eve" when all the ghosts and goblins and frightening spirits are turned loose in full force). All Hallow's Eve was a truly scary time. The worst possible fears were visible—things you never wanted to see.

The richness of All Hallow's Eve is that the forces of darkness came out in such full force because they knew that once November 1 arrived (All Saints Day), they would lose their power. That's why the furious unleashing of evil on October 31. Even the forces of evil knew that their power would be vanquished once people turned their eyes on God's goodness through the lives of saints.

In life's Halloween times, it is easy to be afraid and disgusted and discouraged. There is a natural inclination to give up in despair. When evil shows up, it is a Good Friday time and we understandably recoil and turn away. The cross of Jesus tells us that there is an unmasking of what is horrible that sets the stage for redemption and victory. Without the cross, there would have been no powerful resurrection. Can we believe this reality of Christ's life for ourselves and our world?

November starts – and, at Mt. Zion, goes all month long –reminding us of the power of God's goodness through the lives of dedicated people. The influence of the saints is always more powerful than the most sordid evil. Look for the saints when the unearthing of evil is around us. At Mt. Zion, we not only remember the Saints with gratitude in worship, the next Sunday, we remember the sacrifice of veterans. The following Sunday, we remember God's goodness in the celebration of Thanksgiving and commitment. The next Sunday, we prepare our hearts for Advent – the new Christian year. And in-between the Sundays, we are living the lives of saints in mission projects (Christmas Shoe Boxes are already underway), we are gathering for fellowship and service at the annual barbeque, we are worshipping with others in the community for the Thanksgiving season, meeting with small groups to learn and grow in our faith....and the list goes on and on.

People can very easily see the unnerving Halloween aspects of the world around us. Through our life together, people have the chance to see the hope and the inspiration and the faithfulness of the saints. Even one candle makes a difference in the darkness. Thank God for the church which always calls us to be the saints. We are blessed to be a blessing. *Mary John*



The Prayer Walk is one way to pray for the many blessings of Mt. Zion. Using the Prayer Walk guide, people are encouraged to begin at the Sanctuary and follow the path on the map of the main campus. There are 8 places marked as stops for prayer, beginning at the steps of the Sanctuary, walking down by the cemetery to the Education Building, Family Life Center, the Hut, the Outdoor Chapel and Prayer Labyrinth and back up to the Youth House. There are many different types of autism. Approximately 1/2 of individuals diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder have average or above average IQ. Less than 1/3 of people with autism have an intellectual disability and 1/3 remain nonverbal. Autism:

affects 1 in 68 children (1 out of 42 boys and 1 out of 189 girls) is one of the fastest-growing developmental disorders in the U.S.

costs a family \$60,000 a year on average

STEWARDSHIP

"Celebrating the offering is a spiritual act of worship every believer can actively participate in each week. Giving becomes a celebration when the believer discovers the joy of generosity, which grows out of God's grace." — Melvin Amerson, Celebrating the Offering

WE GIVE

To belong to our congregation is to be a steward. Some may say that "stewardship" is just a polite way of referring to financial giving to the church. But it's far more than that.

One character in some of Jesus' parables is the steward — the servant charged by the master to care for the master's property. It is the master, not the steward, who owns the property, but the steward is responsible for it and is accountable to the master. So it is, said Jesus, between God and us. As God's stewards we have three responsibilities:

- Receiving: We receive with joyful thanksgiving the many gifts that God showers upon us

 time, talent, treasure, our bodies, our
 friendships, natural resources, and the beauty around us.
- Managing: We take good care of what we have received. We manage these resources wisely — for our own good and the good of others.

Giving: Out of our gratitude in receiving so abundantly, we want to share with others. Let's look at four kinds of gifts that we receive, manage, and share:

OUR TIME

We did nothing to earn the hours, the days, the weeks of our lives. Time is a gift of God. How we choose to use it is a matter of stewardship.

Some people lead lives of frenetic activity, al-

ways over-extending themselves to the point of exhaustion, while others sit around in apathetic boredom. Some spend all their hours serving the needs of others at the expense of their own, while others live only for themselves.

As Christian stewards we try to manage time wisely and in a balanced way. And we give our time gladly to family and friends, to strangers, to the community, the church, and to ourselves.

OUR ABILITIES

Do you remember Jesus' parable of the three servants who received different amounts of money to manage while the master was away? We've each received from God distinctive gifts and talents. How we develop and use these talents is a matter of stewardship. Like two of the servants in Jesus' story, we can invest them wisely — or like the third, out of fear we can hide them (Matthew 25:14-30).

As stewards, we acknowledge the gifts we have without apology. We develop them further, practicing new skills and putting our talents to work in ministry.

OUR RESOURCES

We may think that our financial resources are our own. But when we recall that the time, the energy, the good health, and the opportunities for employment behind these dollars are all gifts from God, we see that the funds belong to God too. We are the stewards; God is the owner. So questions about what we earn, how we earn it, how we save, spend, and give it away, are all questions of Christian stewardship.

One vital aspect of our stewardship is our giving to Christ's work in the world. We've learned that giving is most effective when we commit ourselves to give a definite proportion of our income through the church. For many, this proportion is one-tenth, or a tithe. Whatever the amount, we have discovered the joy in giving to God the "first fruits," an amount "off the top" of our income, not what's left over at the end of the month.


